LET'S TALK "TUFF"

Anyone who hasn't heard about the TUFF ONES?

Yes?!

Well, then you just haven't been reading magazines like Car Model and Model Car Science...Or you haven't been down to see your hobby dealer for the past few months.

THE "TUFF ONES"





Time you did, for the Tuff Ones are already making their mark in competition around the country.

For those of you who have missed all the noise, the Tuff Ones are six new Model Motoring cars that can out-corner and outspeed anything to come down the pike. And most important, they drive like any Model Motoring car — just faster (track tested at over 760 scale mph), and better.

How did we track test them before we announced their release? First, we used a high speed oval, about 20 feet long — 20 feet down a straight two-lane track, into a high banked Monza curve; 20 feet back to a second Monza bank; and down the first straight again.

To start with, we took every other car we could get our hands on, regardless of who manufactured it. One at a time, we placed them on the track in front of a Tuff One and gave them full power. Each pair was run 50 laps. Not one car tested could pull away, even as little as one inch, from a Tuff One.

Then we reversed the cars to see how long it would take for a Tuff One to pull away and come around behind the second car. In some cases, it took only 5 or 6 laps. In one, it took the Tuff One 26 circuits to lap the other car. But, in every case, the Tuff One pulled away and consistently ran faster lap times.

Enough?

Not for our engineers! All-out speed is one thing; but cornering is another problem, entirely.

So, a second layout was constructed, using every possible track section in the catalog. Different radius turns, banks, wiggles, cobblestone, bumps — all were included!

Side-by-side runs were discounted immediately, as the engineers wanted to eliminate driver ability and the effect of differing inside and outside radii. Instead, they worked with predetermined and constant voltage.

The results were impressive; even more impressive than the speed trials. There wasn't a single non-Aurora car that could stay on the track for one lap. . At the same time, the Tuff One sample cars were running lap after lap without spinning out or coming off.

But even more important than the ability of the Tuff Ones to out-corner and out-run anything else available — they drive like any other Model Motoring car. And this is where our engineers made an important point... "Unlike the competitors' cars, which either stopped dead when power was shut off, or kept rolling without power, the Tuff Ones handled in a proportional manner to the standard Model Motoring vehicles."

That's it. Just thought you'd like to know the results of our lab tests.

MODEL MOTORING Q & A

Our Model Motoring Experts selected a number of questions most often asked by Miniature Racers in the past few months to answer in this first column. Hereafter, only questions from IMRC Members will be answered here (see IMRC Spotlight).

Q. How many feet and inches make a scale HO Quarter-Mile Dragstrip?

A. Based on the following method, you should be able to figure any scale distance. Since HO scale is 1/87th, first divide 5,280 ft. (1 actual mile) by 87; the resulting 60.7 is the number of feet in a scale HO mile. 1/4 X 60.7 ft. = 15.175, or approximately 15 ft. 2 1/8 in. That's your scale Quarter-Mile.

Q. Where can I get Model Motoring trucks, like the International Truck Trailer, the Box Body Trailer and the Van that Aurora used to make?

A. Three trucks are presently available from Aurora — No. 1362 Mack Dump Truck, No. 1363 Mack Stake Truck, and No. 1364 International Wrecker Tow Truck. They should be available, at \$3.50 each, wherever Aurora Model Motoring products are sold. If your dealer doesn't have them, ask him to order them for you.

Q. Can I still get a Russkit controller, or the 45 and 60 ohm resistors to convert my old 814 model?

A. The Russkit controller is now available from Aurora West, at about \$4.00; and the resistors for the 814 at about \$2.00 each. Ask for them where you get your Model Motoring equipment.

Q. Some Aurora armatures have plain green wire; others have red and green wire. What is the difference? Which is faster?

A. There is no difference. Both are stock 7 1/2 ohm armatures and run at about the same speed. There may be a slight variation, as there is in all armatures, especially if one is older than the other; but not enough to make a real difference.

Q. What's the best way to remove the gear from Aurora's armature shaft?

A. First, cut off the plastic ridges on the top plate; then, using two thin screwdrivers, slip them under the gear from opposite sides and gently pry it off. It can be done with one screwdriver, working from side to side, but it's quite a bit easier with two.

Q. Which Model Motoring car is faster - the Wild One or the Tuff One?

A. The Wild one has a regular 7 1/2 ohm Speedwound armature; the Tuff One, Aurora's newest car, can out-run and out-handle just about anything, including the Wild One. For the inside story, read "Let's Talk Tuff" in this issue — these six are "Wild" AND "Tuff"!.

Q. How do I hook up two power packs for a big layout?

A. Hook up the second power pack right next to the first, connecting the lead wires to the terminal track section just as you did with the wires from the first pack. With this method of hook-up, your voltage remains the same as it was with only one power pack; but your amperage is doubled.

Q. Where can I get instructions on rewinding Model Motoring armatures?

A. The June 1968 issue of Car Model Magazine features an article on how to rewind Aurora armatures. It is available, at 50¢ a copy, from CM Back Issue Dept., 615 Ridge Road, North Arlington, N.J. 07032.

Q. Is there a complete book on hopping up HO cars? Where can I get it?

A. Auto World HO Speed Secrets, written by Jerry Broz; the section on rewinding Aurora armatures includes recommended footage and suggested wire sizes; also included are tips from HOCCI Champions, like Ted Johnson, Bert Haas, and HOPRA Co-Director Carl Dreher, '69 Car Model HO Champion. The book is available, at 50¢, from hobby shops and departments and newsstands.

ALL NEW SETS FOR 1970! ...WELL, ALL BUT ONE

At the big Toy Fair in New York City, early in March, Aurora took the wraps off their NEW line of Model Motoring Sets. With one exception — the 4-lane Championship 500 — every set is new for 1970!

Two of these sets feature a spanking new innovation — the SPEED CONTROL CONSOLE, which combines two controls, a terminal track and a lap counter, in one compact unit...No more wires all over the place. The only thing to hook up is the power pack. The rest is automatically taken care of; and the lap counter is right in front of the drivers, for easy observation.

The CONSOLE 8 Set (No. 1301) heads the list of the new Aurora line and features, in addition to the new Speed Control Console with integral lap counter, a wiggle track and 8 curves.

Number two set in the line is the new CONSOLE TWISTER (No. 1303), also featuring the compact Speed Control Console. In addition, this set includes squeeze tracks, wiggle track, cobblestone, and 13 more straights and curves.


Two exclusive Grand Prix cars are the big plus in the "FORMULA I WHIP" Set (No. 1304), which also includes a high bank Monza curve. 24 sections of track make hundreds of different layout combinations possible.


Set number four in the new series is the "24 HOURS of LEMANS" (No. 1323), with special Flamethrower cars for day and NIGHT racing. Headlights are the big feature here... for racing in a pitch black room. And don't forget the 20 feet of track in the set — lots of flexibility.

The only hold-over from 1969 is the timeproven CHAMPIONSHIP 500 Set (No. 1324) for four-lane racing. For big families or clubs, it's perfect.

And for the man or boy who doesn't want to spend time assembling a Model Motoring set, Aurora is introducing "HIGH SIERRA" (No. 1325). Get this — it comes pre-assembled, on a pre-formed and pre-painted layout. All you do is slide it out of the box, hook up your wires, and you're running. And, for future expansion. Aurora used standard Model Motoring track, so all you have to do is take it off the 3-D layout, pull out a couple of locks and joiners, and fit in any regular accessory track sections available.

That's it — the 1970 line of Aurora Model Motoring Sets...And you've got the word on it before anyone else in your neighborhood.




